1. High Level Meeting & 1st ANCCA Scientific Annual Conference

1.1. Abstract Submissions Details

- Ms Akane (JP) explained on the mechanism of abstract submissions. She mentioned that the vendor (Klar) will be creating a Dropbox folder for submission of abstracts. They are currently working on the abstract template which is to be sent out to the speakers when ready.
- Chairs of the Scientific conference should finalise the speakers in their session. Once finalised, they would need to share the names and email addresses with NCC Japan's email (jp-ancca@ncc.go.jp).
- Deadline for abstracts submission are on September 26th (Monday).
- Deadline for presentation video submission is on October 7th (Friday).

1.2. Video Presentation

- Recording of Video Presentation
 - Dr Zhang Yawei (CN) brought up the topic on the Video Presentation.
 - Prof William (SG) confirmed that the video will help with the timing and flow of the event where each presentation will be kept to the allocated time. At the same, he mentioned that it is necessary for the speakers to be present during their presentation for the Q&A segment.
 - Prof William also suggested to use Zoom to record and export their presentation and talk. This can be easily uploaded into the Dropbox folder. However, the concern is the size limits of the Dropbox.
 - Ms Akane then suggested to use PowerPoint to record as it will be a smaller file.
 - Dr Zhang Yawei also suggested another app which she frequently use. Dr Zhang will provide the name of the app and show how to do the recording using the app.
 - Ms Akane will also consult with the vendor on the best way to record the presentation.
- Uploading onto the Website
 - Dr Matsuda (JP) suggested to upload the presentation videos onto the website for those who are not able to attend the conference. He also suggested for the vendor (Klar) to create a



consent form for the speakers to let them know that their video will be uploaded to the website for public viewing.

- Dr Laureline (JP) suggested to remove sensitive information from the video and presentation before uploading onto the website.
- More discussion is needed with speakers before moving forward.

1.3. Finalising the line-up and programme outline (for details of current agenda status, see attachment 1 [here](#) below)

- Session 1
 - Dr Clarito Cairo (Phillipines) confirmed his talk title – “The Philippine Experience on Patients’ Access to Cancer Treatment and Care”.
 - Prof William and Dr Matsuda agreed to condense the session title to “Virtual Platforms” and remove “...For cancer Prevention and Control”.
- Session 3
 - Dr Huiyao Huang (CN) queried on the status of the proposed speaker from Thailand which was mentioned in the last meeting.
 - Speaker 3 is to be determined and proposed.
 - China has yet to contact the speaker as they are waiting for Thailand NCI to provide with a name.

2. ANCCA Logo Design Update

2.1. Review of the proposed designs

- Dr Matsuda mentioned that there is a need to update the current ANCCA logo as it is in a jpeg and not vector format. This makes it hard to enlarge the logo in collaterals due to the quality.
- He also mentioned that the map in the current logo does not include some countries.
- The designer has proposed 6 options (A, B, C, D, E and F). Dr Matsuda requested for opinions and feedback.
- Option A is the most favoured choice.
- Dr Sarah Abe questioned on the consistency of the English used – Centres (American spelling) vs. Centres (British spelling).
- Majority agreed to keep to American English – “Asian National Cancer Centers Alliance”.
- The slogan was also confirmed to be “Asians United Against Cancers”.
- The colour green was selected it best represents Asia e.g., Asia is represented by the green ring in the Olympics.
- The majority also preferred the current logo design, but incorporating the revised map.

3. Subcommittee update and discussion

3.1. Subcommittee 3 – Asian Code Against Cancer

- Dr Sok King and Dr Sarah Abe (JP) gave an update on the ANCCA manuscript
 - Dr Sarah Abe called for suggestions and feedback on the key findings – a summary of contribution from ANCCA members – “Key Recommendations on cancer Prevention” (Table 3)
 - Dr Sarah Abe and Dr Sok King (BN) edited based on Asian context and perspective
 - E.g., “Stop Smoking”: The initial wordings from European court was “Do not smoke”.
 - The edit: “Say no to any tobacco product. Take action”
 - All recommendations provided in the table starts with a verb.

3.2. Subcommittee 7 – PPP

- Prof William updated that they are working to create a business bank account for philanthropy or sponsors. This will facilitate in money flow.
- Website Update



- Dr Azmi (ID) updated that Indonesia is agreeable to fund the new website. The website host and domain will remain the same but a new template will be created
- This is to allow every country to access their page and edit independently
- Homepage will only be accessible to admin team (website team)
- The website team will set up a meeting to discuss further and create a mock-up of the website
- Prof William and Dr Azmi will discuss how to create a template for each member to input information and items onto the website

3.3. Subcommittee 6 – Research and Clinical Trials

- CAMs (Complementary and Alternative Medicines) Survey by Dr. Kwon from Chungnam National University Sejong Hospital
 - Mr Han (KR) shared on the CAM survey by Chungnam National Hospital
 - Only 9 respondents from 4 members (Brunei, China, Malaysia and Vietnam) contributed.
 - Mr Han will be sharing the summary slides with members after the meeting (see summary slides as pdf in the email sent by ANCCA secretariat to all ANCCA members on Sep. 9, 2022)
- Facility-based survey on cervical cancer diagnosis and staging in Asia: Dr. Rei Haruyama asked ANCCA members to collaborate on the survey that will be shared with the minutes (see attachment [2 here](#))

4. Update on Asia Workshop on Multi-disciplinary Teams (MDT) (C/CAN-ANCCA)

- 4.1. Dr Thet Ko Aung informed members that the event will be delayed to 2023. He will contact speakers and ANCCA to fix the most appropriate date (expected on Q1 2023).

Cervical cancer is largely preventable, yet it is the second most common cause of cancer deaths in women under 65 years old globally. In Asian National Cancer Centers Alliance (ANCCA) participating countries, the cervical cancer incidence rate ranges from 5 to 24 per 100,000 women. This survey aims to understand the current practices in diagnosis, staging, and data availability of cervical cancer at cancer care hospitals in Asia.
